

Orchid inDIGESTion

Fringe benefits! This is probably one of the most important advantages we think of in connection with our vocation. There may be occasions that the value of these compensations can equal or surpass the "salary."

There is no hobby, in my estimation, that can come close to growing orchids, with so many advantages. Of course, the challenge of maintaining a good collection is very rewarding. The very fact that the different genera require varied conditions, leads us to study and teaches us to have patience.

Fortunate is the hobbyist, like myself, that has a mate (in my case my dear wife, Ruby) that shares and is enthusiastic about the same fun activity. Many times, when we have a problem of any kind, we "lose" ourselves in the greenhouse and, mysteriously, the problem disappears, never showing up to haunt us again.

Without a doubt, the very most valuable asset that orchid growing has brought us is friendship. The hobby is, for some unknown reason, the common interest that removes all obstacles, real or imagined, to a fine relationship with almost everyone infected with "orchiditis." Some of our very valued friends, I know, must make sacrifices in order to have funds to buy a moderately priced plant that they have wishes for and there are some that could buy a collection, much better than ours, and hardly notice the expenditure on their bank statement. Put us all together and we have one "heluva" time. It is very satisfying to hear Dr. "Horticulture" tell Mr. "Fungrower" that he has learned something from their discussions and vice versa.

When visiting a foreign country, we have found that there is an immediate friendship established because of our common interest that is not, in any way, affected by differences in race, religious beliefs, politics or language. As a matter of fact, we have spent hours with growers, in an orchid growing area and the only conversation was done by "sign language" and the names of plants. The result was extremely interesting to us and, we hope, our friends. We do have one language in common, "Orchidese."

It is rewarding to share your plants with friends and to exchange a favorite that "you will not sell at any price" for one that they "would never let out of their hands."

The telephone companies have really benefited from our hobby. Never before orchids, even when I was in the manufacturing business, have I had the telephone bills that I now enjoy (enjoy?). Likewise, never have I received telephone calls from all over the U.S. and, would you believe, England, Asia, South Africa and Australia for any reason,

until now, and the calls are usually to discuss whatever is in blossom or something equally as important.

My poor old camera collection . . . starting with a "Brownie" box camera and the usual "travel" cameras, we now find we must have "Macro" lenses, tripods, proper backgrounds, correct lighting and favorite film. Is this a "fringe benefit"? It surely is! Maybe the box cameras were good enough for pictures of our children but surely not sophisticated enough to photograph that fine toothed, green ribbed staminode in the unusual "whatinitis." Anything that can create the many "side interests" in both the very young and the very old must be a blessing that more people deserve.

It would take pages to tell of experiences that have been rewarding in connection with our hobby . . . now grown to hobbies . . . book collecting, picture masses, flower arrangements, correspondence, travel, and on and on, with each day bringing a new challenge and an old problem solved. Lucky us!

judges' choice: pleurothallis marthae

The November Judge's Choice, *Pleurothallis marthae* (syn. *Acronia marthae*), was purchased at the November 2006

Thanksgiving weekend auction of the Maryland Orchid Society as a small plant in a 3" pot. *P. marthae*, while under my care, has been a consistently good grower, *i.e.*, not fussy about its growing conditions. It receives moderately bright light, between phalaenopsis and Cattleya brightness, intermediate winter night temperatures which are usually about 54° F, and summer daytime temperatures around 84° and 86° F. Its potting medium, a bark-peat moss-perlite mix, is kept moist and with regular misting the relative humidity remains high. Light fertilization every third or fourth watering and good, constant air movement complete its growing regime. This plant blooms heavily during the late fall, but usually blooms lightly at various times through the year

Pleurothallis marthae has been repotted every two years, each time being moved into a larger pot, until it is now in a 10" bulb pan.

At this time, I don't think that *P. marthae* will be moved into a larger container because it is large enough. Due to its size, it is obviously not a candidate for windowsill growing or an otherwise limited growing space, so for a hobby grower this poses a major problem. However, for someone able to provide the required space and humidity it can be an easy and worthwhile plant.
