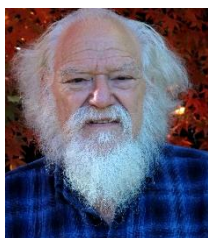

May 21 Program Leon Glicenstein Jewel Orchids - species and hybrids

Leon Glicenstein, Ph.D., began growing orchids in 1954, and became assistant to the curator of orchids at the Brooklyn Botanic Gardens, then Carl Withner, from 1957 to 1960.

He has advanced degrees in Chemistry and Horticulture, with an emphasis on plant breeding, cytology, and cytogenetics. Working as a plant breeder for five years at Linda Vista S.A. in Costa Rica, he photographed, in the wild, approximately 80% of the then known orchid species of Costa Rica. He also found new species such as *Telipogon glicensteinii*, *Macroclinium glicensteinii*, *Pterichis leo*, *Stenorrhynchos glicensteinii*, and *Lepanthes glicensteinii*. He won the second American Orchid Society Dillon/Peterson Essay Contest using one of his Costa Rican experiences. He has photographed many of the orchids in the Northeastern United States, Florida, and all of the orchids in California, where he located some taxa not formerly known to exist there. As a respected lecturer, has given numerous conservation oriented programs both nationally and internationally, showing orchids growing in their native habitats. Leon has been an invited guest speaker at both the Vancouver and Miami World Orchid Conferences. He has published numerous articles in the American Orchid Society magazine [including a 10 part series on Jewel and Painted-leaf Orchids with a supplement] and some in the Orchid Digest.

Leon joined Hoosier Orchid Company in September 1998. As a breeder, as well as a grower, of orchids at Hoosier Orchid Company Leon specialized in working with members of the *Pteruothalidae*, *Zygopetalinae*, *Gongorinae*, *Angraecoid*, Jewel and Painted-leaf orchids, as well as other groups. He has created numerous novel and new combination not before known, thereby extended our knowledge of generic relationships within the orchid family. Since the demise of Hoosier Orchid Company Leon has been consulting with other orchid companies on growing orchids from seed. A strong conservationist, Leon was a past chairperson of the American Orchid Societies Conservation Committee, and had been a member of this committee for decades. He represented the AOS at the international conservation meeting in Costa Rica in 2007. In 2013 Leon was elected to the position of "Fellow of the American Orchid Society" for "... outstanding contributions to conservation, hybridizing, and the educational advancement of the Orchidaceae" [AOS's words], an honor given to only nine other people since the inception of the American Orchid Society. Before coming to Hoosier Orchid Company he worked for an internationally known plant breeding company breeding crops such as *Chrysanthemum*, *Carnation*, *Azalea* and *Roses*. Since Hoosiers orchid Company's closing Leon has lived in State College, PA growing and breeding *Habenarias* and a few other genera as well as giving in-person orchid programs to orchid societies.

May 21 Are We There Yet? Preparing Orchids For Outdoors Vacation by Sarah Spence

Education New Feature *Orchid Clinic* May 21, 2026 , 6:45 to 7:10 pm.

- Any member may present a distressed orchid suspected to have an infection, pest, or improper culture issue. So if you are not sure why your orchid looks unhappy, this is your chance to find out why.
- If unable to bring the orchid in for examination, the less desirable option is presenting several photos.
- A member of the Education Committee or other knowledgeable member will assess the orchid for a likely cause for distress, suggesting possible remediation.
- Any plant to be examined must be packaged to ensure isolation of any pathogen. The isolation will need to be continued until transport home. The Education Committee will be responsible for cleanup of contaminated surfaces.
- Any conclusion regarding the reason for an orchid's distress is based on the personal experience or knowledge of the examiner. There may be no discernible or agreed upon reason for the distressed orchid.

October 29, 1942 — March 22, 2026

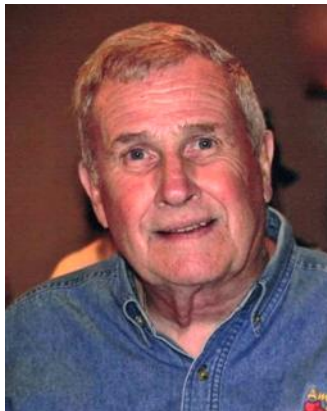
MOS has just recently lost a valued Life Member, a pillar of the society and friend. We mourn his passing but celebrate his life and our opportunity to have been part of it. Ernie joined MOS in 1981 and dedicated himself to 45 years of service to MOS.

He was the *master box maker* for plants at our Annual Auction and Annual Show. He secured a shed for the society for free and located a place to store it for free.

He was ever present at our annual auction and secured our current location. He also supported our annual show as a mover of staging material from the shed, judging clerk and every day making boxes. He also supported 'House' by setting up our meeting room. He will be missed.

In March of 2025 MOS Member Jos Venturina, wanted to honor the many years of service Ernie gave the Society. Jos had a beautiful unnamed *Rhyncholaeliocattleya* hybrid which was made by the Sunset Valley Orchid Company. The Hybrids parents were Rth. Guess What x Rlc. Little Toshie. This was a commercially sold cross so there are many babies that have been distributed. Jos received permission from Sunset Valley to register this cross with the Royal Horticultural Society and name the hybrid *Rhyncholaeliocattleya* Ernest Drohan. This was accomplished March 7, 2025. After that date all the babies the cross yielded carried the Ernest Drohan name.

The next honor has just occurred this March 1, 2026, one baby plant is owned by Charles Stiers submitted his plant to the American Orchid Society judging in San Antonio Texas. This plant received **78-point HCC** and was given the clonal name ***Rhyncholaeliocattleya* Ernest Drohan 'Randy's Costco Pizza'**. Ernie will continue to live on through his namesake orchid plant and in our hearts.

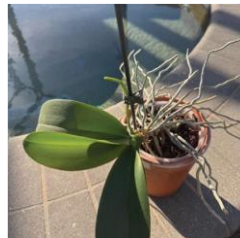


COLD DAMAGE QUESTION

I left my house in December, and the temperature dropped significantly. I think it likely went into the mid -50s F (low teens C). When I came back, a handful of my novelty phalaenopsis had discolored leaves like the one in this picture. Some are splotchy like this, while others have an almost red tint. Is this cold damage, or something else? Can I bring them back to health again?

ANSWER

This looks like cold damage, and the reddish tint you saw in some plants is an indication. Cold damage can occur if the temperature drops too quickly or drops to a level too low for a particular plant to tolerate, and some groups of orchids, such as *Phalaenopsis violacea* and *bellina*, are notoriously sensitive. Whether or not a given plant will survive depends on the plant in question and how much damage has been done. Your plants that developed coppery or reddish foliage are likely fine, and the damaged chlorophyll will be replaced. The damage to the plant in the photograph is not the result of chlorophyll damage; it is due to outright damage to the leaf tissue. I have lost both *Phal. violacea* and *bellina* that looked like the plant in the photograph. The only thing you can do with cold damaged plants is to avoid overwatering them, keep them out of overly bright light, and hope for new growth.



REPOTTING PHALAENOPSIS QUESTION

I have several phalaenopsis that I need to repot this spring. They all have a lot of air roots. Someone told me I need to cut these off unless I mount the plant. Is this true?

ANSWER

Roots develop in specific forms based on the environment in which they develop. Roots that grow in sphagnum moss look very different from roots that grow in a fir bark mix. Those produced in the constantly moist moss environment are thicker, and there are fewer. They tend to be lighter in color, and they need greater hydration. Roots that develop in the air are gray when dry, adapted to absorb moisture from the air and not remain wet in a potting mix. If aerial roots are crammed into a pot, you will lose many of them. At the same time, the plant is growing new roots to replace the old ones. What do you do when repotting plants like this? If you intend to put aerial roots into the new pot, then trim them back to a length that fits the pot without cramming them into the bottom of the pot. Cramming aerial roots into the pot does a lot of damage to them. Roots trimmed to at least a couple of inches long or more will branch and, rather quickly, replace what you trimmed. This plant is growing horizontally, as one would in the wild. We turn them vertically because they display better fit into a pot better. In the wild, they eventually become horizontal or, even slightly pendent, in response to light levels, and shed water from the crown. When you repot this plant, you will notice some roots growing down into the pot. Remove any that are dead or diseased, as well as any stem below the surface that have died. You can then either trim the aerial roots to fit in the pot or repot the plant vertically in the new pot. Or, you can repot the plant as it is now growing, leaving the aerial roots out in the air.

Show Table Rules apply to both the in person show table and the virtual show table and are located in your Roster and on the website at <http://www.marylandorchids.org/showtablerules2024.html>

The following General Rules govern the operation of our Show Table, whether In Person, or Virtual type, or in combination.

1. Exhibitors must be members in good standing of the Maryland Orchid Society.
2. Each membership, whether single, dual or family, will be considered one exhibitor.
3. Exhibitor Points will be given at each of the 10 Monthly Program Meetings, for In Person, and Virtual Show Table, or in combination. Each member exhibiting one or more plants will receive one point [1] per event.
4. Exhibitors may also earn Exhibitor Points by exhibiting one or more plants at the Maryland Orchid Society Show or by lending plants to the Society to be used in our away shows or exhibits, one point [1] per participation. Plants loaned for shows or exhibits do not have to be owned for six [6] months.
5. At the end of the year, the Exhibitor Points will be totaled, and one [1] seedling/plant will be awarded for each three [3] Exhibitor Points at the September meeting.
6. Exhibitor Points will not carry over to next year.

The Virtual Show Table is intended to provide Show Table participation for virtual viewing. It is non-competitive and managed by a Coordinator.

Non-Competitive— For education, jewel (foliage) and an opportunity to display plants that arrive too late for other classes. In this class, members are encouraged to exhibit plants that cannot be exhibited in any other class (e.g., owned less than six [6] months, grower not wishing to compete, etc.)
